



Canadian Multiplication

You need:

- Chips/tokens the size of the game's squares (pieces of paper are also good), in two colors (or marked with a sign).
- Two pawns (beads or similar).
- The game board (page 2)

Rules of the game:

1. You play this game one against one, one against two or two against two.
2. In the 6x6 table (see page 2), play with the chips/tokens. Below the table, the numbers 1 to 9 are shown in boxes. The two pawns are placed on these numbers.
3. You win the game if you are the first to win four boxes in a row in the 6x6 table. The direction of the row can be horizontal, vertical or diagonal.
4. When it is your turn, you try to conquer a square in the 6x6 table by multiplying two numbers. Those numbers are in the boxes below the table and are covered by the two pawns. On a captured square in the 6x6 table, you place a chip or token.
5. When it is your turn, **you may only move one pawn.**
Only the person who starts may place both pawns on a number. The pawns can be on the same number. When moving a pawn, you do not have to choose a square adjacent to the previous square where the pawn was standing.
6. The players decide together who starts
